## My Favorite Christmas Flower - Bonnie Eddy

If you were asked what flower is associated with Christmas, the majority of you would answer the poinsettia, the birth flower for December babies. How do you pronounce that name? There are three different pronunciations:

**poin SET-ee-a, poin-SET-tee-a, and point-SET-ah.**

When I started this research, I found numerous references for a decorated pull-up Christmas tree (only \$199.99), printed velvet tree skirts, glass ornaments, flower garlands, coasters, mugs, a cocktail recipe, and the list goes on. I also found something completely new to me, but not to my husband, - the Poinsettia Bowl. San Diego put this successful bowl game on the map. The objective to generate tourism and economic benefit for the San Diego region has been met with an annual economic impact of over \$11 million.

Can you remember a holiday without these flowers? Do you know that the flowers are the yellow centers that are surrounded by the brilliant red bracts and resemble stars?

History tells us that a German botanist saw it pushing through a crack in his greenhouse floor and named it *Euphorbia pulcherrima* (beautiful). The common name of poinsettia came from Joel Robert Poinsett, the founder of the Smithsonian Institute and first U.S. ambassador to Mexico. He found the plants in southern Mexico and brought them to our country in 1825. December 12 is National Poinsettia Day that marks the date of his death.

The history before Poinsett goes back to the Aztecs in southern Mexico who used the bracts to make red dye and used it for medicine for fevers. For many years, people believed that the poinsettia was poisonous. Research has proven

that to be wrong. A person or animal might get a stomach ache, but they wouldn't eat much because of its bitter taste.

There are Mexican legends for the poinsettia, known as the flowers of the Holy Night. One legend has a young girl wishing to give a present to baby Jesus but had no money. As she walked to visit the Christ child, she picked weeds along the road. As she prepared to give her weeds at the altar, they quickly transformed into vibrant and beautiful flowers. Mexicans also believe the poinsettia is a symbol of the holy Star of Bethlehem.



Our Christian story tells that the Star of Bethlehem led the Magi the many miles they traveled to see the Christ child. It also announced the birth to the shepherds.

How to care for this plant once you bring it into your house? Because it is a tropical plant, set it near a sunny window - south, east, or west is better than north. Have it in a heat area of 65 - 75 degrees F. during the day. Lower temperatures are okay at night. Water it when the surface becomes dry and until the water drains out the bottom. The experts say to take it out of the foil cover or punch a hole in its bottom. I ignore that advice and have never had any trouble. If you want to keep it until next Christmas, do a computer search that will guide you with month by month instructions. I always plant mine outside in the spring but have given up trying to get them to bloom again.

My traction is not as graceful as it once was.

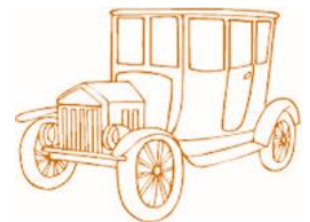
I slip and slide and skid and bump into things even in the best of weather.

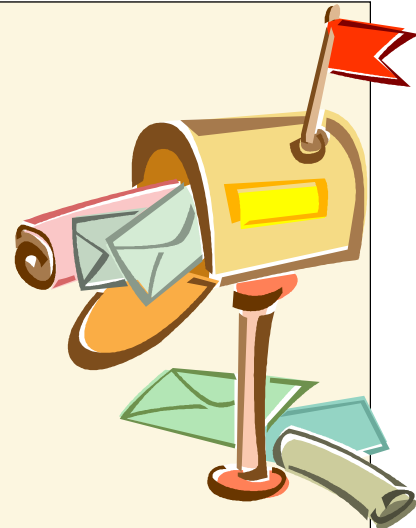
